

"Creating a Man," a three-act play by Necip Fazil Kısakürek, was written in 1937 and is considered a masterful work in Turkish theater. The narrative explores the profound psychological torment experienced by a playwright grappling with the fears of death, the agony of artistic creation, and the inescapable grip of fate. Set against the dark and suffocating backdrop of Istanbul during an unspecified time, the play delves into the complexities of existence and the human psyche. As Hüsrev spirals deeper into paranoia and isolation, the haunting conclusion leaves audiences reflecting on the intricate interplay of creativity, despair, and the quest for truth.
